

This date indicates the **due date for current charges**. If payment is not received after $\mathbf{0} \rightarrow$ 15 days past billing date, a past due notice is mailed and service is subject to disconnect. This number is your **meter number**. It is linked in our office with your location. When **2→** reporting a power outage or service problems, this number is most helpful to our dispatcher and line crews. These words or numbers are your **meter description**, i.e., a label for a particular **8 →** building or particular operation requiring its own meter Kilowatt-hours (kWh) is how your electric usage is measured. The dates of your meter readings are recorded as well as the readings themselves. The usage figure on 4-> your bill is the difference of the previous and present readings multiplied by the number listed in the next column. (The multiplier is determined by the kind of meter installed for high usage accounts) This is the number of your **rate class**. You may refer to the section of this booklet 6-> entitled "Your Monthly Electric Rates" to determine your electric rate charge. The amount of **demand** or load your operation puts on the system at any given time is 6 -> measured in kilowatts. Your kW charge is your peak demand for the month, times the rate class multiplier and the rate. Base Charges - The 'Facility Charge' is the monthly base amount charged for providing electric service. It includes costs of meter reading, billing, administrative overhead, **0** → maintenance and repair of system poles, lines, transformers, meters, etc. These have been itemized by MCREA per member account. Energy Charges - The 'Energy Charge per kWh Rate' denotes the cost of purchasing our power from our provider, Tri-State Generation & Transmission, and the distribution 8 -> of electricity from MCREA's substations to your home or business. The 'Demand Charge per kW' lists the demand charge explained above. State tax is payable on total charges. Additional information about your average daily electrical use and average daily cost is 9provided at the bottom of each bill.
